400 Job Losses in North Cork Due to Dell Closure

THE impending closure of computer giant Dell will mean that 400 jobs will be lost in North Cork.

Figures released by Enterprise Ireland this week revealed that the closure of the multinational computer business at Limerick will hugely increase unemployment for North Cork. It is expected that by this November the majority of the 1,900 Dell employees at the Limerick plant will be redundant. The roll-out of redundancies will start to take effect this Mav.

Regional Manager at Enterprise Ireland Martin Doyle attended a special meeting at Annabella in Mallow last Monday. At the meeting he revealed the massive impact that Dell's closure will have on the North Cork region.

County councillors from throughout North Cork attended the presentation by Mr Doyle, who outlined the importance of promoting the establishment of new businesses in the area.

Enterprise Ireland plans to hold a seminar in Charleville this March. The seminar will offer advice for people interested in setting up new businesses. Mr Doyle indicated that Charleville was chosen as the

first area for this seminar due to the high levels of job losses resulting from Dell's closure.

Speaking to The Corkman, county Cllr Michael Donegan estimated that the closure of Dell will see the greatest level of job losses for Charleville in a decade. According to Mr Donegan, the closure of Dell for Charleville could be compared to an estimated 100 redundancies at Golden Vale in the town ten years ago.

"I know a lot of people who have families living in Milford and Newtownshandrum that were reliant on Dell. Out of the 400 people who will lose their iobs around North Cork, it is hoped that some will start new businesses, and the seminar in March might help them," said Cllr Donegan

At the Enterprise Ireland presentation last Monday, Cllr Tom Sheahan expressed serious concern about the level of unemployment in Mallow. He pointed out that while Charleville is suffering job losses, Mallow should be viewed as a priority.

Cllr Sheahan pointed out that in the past few years thousands of jobs have been lost in Mallow. Redundancies at Dairygold, the closure of Nestle and the sugar factory were given as the main causes of Mallow's jobs losses. Cllr Sheahan added that falling car sales will soon result in a significant amount of redundancies at Kostal, Mallow's only major employer.

Noting that the presentation did not mention Duhallow, Cllr Noel Buckley pointed out that Duhallow is seen as a 'unemployment' blackspot.

Mr Doyle called for the community to become involved in setting up new businesses around North Cork.

He explained that an Enterprise Ireland building can be set up in an area if the council donate land. The community then provide 5% of the cost while Enterprise Ireland will supply the balance required.

Live register figures show that unemployment in Mallow stood at 957 in January 2008 while this January it was 1,908.

Figures for Newmarket stood at 624 in January 2008, while this January they stood at 1,209.

The Driscoll DNA Project



The Driscoll DNA project of the Clan O'Drisin Baltimore. county Cork. is registered with The Clans of Ireland Ltd. The project was founded in 2004 and there are now 45 different Driscoll men who have had the DNA. The Y chromosome is analvzed since this passed from father to son along with the surname. Their DNA will now be referred to as yDNA. The main purpose of the project is to serve as a genealogical tool. Men whose yDNA matches closely have a common genealogy even if they lack the records to show how.

Consider Edward J Driscoll's whose ancestor John Driscoll immigrated from Bandon, Cork in the spring of 1850 and landed in New York with a cousin. John and his cousin were separated and never found each other thereafter.

Trying to find a John Driscoll in Irish records of the right age who could have immigrated from Bandon results in too many possibilities and more information is needed to narrow down the search.

When Sharon Martin joined the project it turned out the yDNA of her donor William P Driscoll matched Edward J Driscoll at 65 of 67 markers. It is quite possible that Sharon's ancestor Patrick Driscoll born about 1831 in Skeaf of the Clogough Parish in county Cork is the cousin mentioned above. Edward and Sharon are now collaborating with one another and Edward has a clue that his ancestor may have originated in Clogough Parish.

Another purpose of the project is to critically examine the recorded history of the O'Driscoll. The forbear of the O'Driscoll is said to be hEidirsceoil, born about 910 A.D., a descendant of the Corca Laoighdhe clan. Heretofore it has been assumed that everyone named Driscoll shared a common ancestor in hEidirsceoil and implicitly the same vDNA. We now know that not all Driscoll have the

same yDNA since there are several different genetic branches to the O'Driscoll family tree and only one of them can be that of hEidirsceoil.

Nevertheless some of the O'Driscoll who do not carry the yDNA of hEidirsceoil may still be among his descendants. To illustrate how consider the problem posed by Éamon Lankford in his book O Driscolls Past and Present. Therein he writes "a central and tantalizing mystery for present day O Driscolls is should be considered 'The O Driscoll', the hereditary chieftain of the clan." Even if the genetic signature of hEidirsceoil is identified it does not solve the mystery since the hereditary chief's yDNA line can vary in time. One way this happens is when there is no son to take the chief's place and instead the heir is an unrelated son-in-law changes who name to O'Driscoll. The grandson of such a chief would then be his descendant by way of his daughter but would not carry the chief's yDNA.

We are close to identifying the genetic signature of hEidirsceoil by comparing Driscoll

yDNA with that of other clans also descended from the Corca Laoighdhe such as the O Cobhthaigh (O'Coffey), O Laoghaire (O'Leary) and the Muintir Oh Illigh (Hill). In the early 1600's many of the O'Driscoll fled to Spain and we would like to test the vDNA of their male line descendants to provide more data.
